Located in Lakewood and serving all of Colorado, BIA has served over 10,000 individuals since its founding in 2015. BIA aims to make



healthcare more accessible by providing education and navigation services, as well as application assis-

tance. Unsure which benefits you qualify for? Need help understanding and applying for healthcare or food assistance (SNAP)? BIA is here to help—free of charge!

Through education events and one-on-one appointments, BIA strives to keep the community informed about healthcare options and aware of our services, which make Medicare, Medicaid, SNAP, and other programs more accessible to those who qualify. Then, BIA Navigators will get clients the help they need. Our Navigators work with clients to understand which programs they could apply for and walk with them through the application process to start receiving benefits. If BIA cannot deliver the services needed, we do our best to connect you with the right resource in our network of assistance providers.

In response to the unprecedented need caused by COVID-19, Benefits in Action also started delivering food to families in need and homebound adults in Adams, Arapahoe, Denver, and Jefferson counties in April of 2020. The demand for boxes of fresh and nonperishable foods delivered safely to homes in the wake of a pandemic quickly established our food delivery program, which is now an important part of our organization.

At the start of the pandemic, BIA also transitioned to work remotely to protect the health and safety of our staff and clients. Providing the same services virtually, we now know that not even a global pandemic can stop us from getting our clients assistance. Today, BIA is operating in a hybrid model—some remote and some working in a safe (physically-distanced, masked, or vaccinated) workspace.

Advocacy Corner by David Bolin

American Rescue Plan Act: The Department of Health Care Policy and Financing has posted the Plan that they submitted to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) on June 12th at:

If CMS approves the plan, the Joint Budget Committee also has to approve the plan of spending. They plan to spend money on (1) Strengthening the Workforce for HCBS and Enhance Rural Sustainability; (2) Improve Crisis and Acute Services; (3) Improve Access to HCBS for Underserved Populations; (4) Support Post-Covid Recovery and HCBS Innovation; (5) Strengthen Case Management Redesign; (6) Invest in Tools and Technology; (7) Expand Emergency Preparedness; and (8) Enhance Quality Outcomes. One highlight is under strengthening the workforce, which intends to standardize training with the Community College system and the "hope to expand opportunities for workforce development."

Nationally, the advocacy team is monitoring the various bills on infrastructure and caregiving. Each state is taking a different approach, but the overall themes to emerge from Colorado are similar across the US.

For IHSS Consumer/Attendants: HCPF started using a Utilization Review/Utilization Management (URUM) vendor, Telligen on March 1st to review all Prior Authorization Requests for Health Maintenance Activities (HMA). Some of you have been adversely affected due to the slowness of the system in place. Case management agencies may contact you to get additional documentation to support the need for HMA. Documentation could include more information from your physician, exercise plans, or other items to support HMA. Our IHSS and PAR team staff will help you gather the information requested to prevent service interruptions.

For Pediatric Home Health clients/CNAs: HCPF will start having a new and different URUM vendor for Home Health (KEPRO) to review Prior Authorization Requests in July or August. The Home Health Department and PAR Team are your go to contacts if you have questions.

HCPF develops Person Centered Planning for People with Disabilities: HCPF has developed an online 10-week course with the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs for clients to receive training on conducting their own person-centered planning sessions. Suggestions: The Advocacy Team is planning for the next Colorado Legislative Session starting in January and is interested in hearing suggestions of homecare items to ask the Legislature to address.



New DD Waiver Slots Authorized

Wonderful news has been announced by the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing (HCPF)!

The Colorado General Assembly has authorized an additional 667 HCBS-DD Waiver slots. Under this new allocation, the General Assembly has appropriated a one-time funding amount to manage the DD-Waiver waitlist to ensure equitable access to services.

DID YOU KNOW?

- PASCO provides services under the DD waiver, including Individual Residential Services & Supports (IRSS), Supported Community Connections (SCC), and Specialized Habilitation.
- PASCO has provided transitions from home health to I/DD services for many of our clients and can help your family understand the benefits of either choice for your individual situation. We have a team of knowledgeable experts ready to assist.
- Colorado Medicaid provided this Fact Sheet to help provide some context and orientation, and we can answer many of the questions you might have in how this would impact pay, benefits, and service you may currently receive from PASCO.

Caring for Someone with Cerebral Palsy

Cerebral palsy (CP) is the most common childhood disability. In the United States, about 764,000 people currently have this condition. While some exhibit only a few symptoms, others need assistance with basic activities like walking and eating.

Depending on the severity of the condition, caring for someone with cerebral palsy can be complicated. Since CP affects motor skills, you may need to help the individual walk, go to the bathroom, eat, and dress. It's important to understand that cerebral palsy isn't a disease. It's a condition that affects areas of an individual's brain that are responsible for movement.

CP occurs due to abnormal brain development or an injury to a developing brain, usually this happens before birth. However, it can also occur during the first years of a child's life. People with cerebral palsy often suffer from associated health conditions. Some of them are the result of CP while others are unrelated but commonly occurring together with the condition such as:

- · Respiratory Problems
- Digestive Problems
- Hearing Impairment
- · Speech Impairment
- Vision Impairment
- Epilepsy

People with CP also report sleep problems due to muscle spasms, limited ability to change positions during sleeping. Some individuals also experience ongoing pain. With the right approach to care, people with cerebral palsy can improve their quality of life tremendously. Even if they suffer from severe CP, proper assistance can make a significant difference. 

Find the Right Services and Support For Children with Disabilities

Families of children with disabilities or special needs often face a confusing and difficult path when seeking therapy, support and other assistance. There is no roadmap, and the process of locating and selecting providers can be overwhelming.

A new service called Mountain Summit Consulting aims to bring clarity to the process and help families find their way. Recently launched by Erin Schneider, a mother of an autistic son, Mountain Summit Consulting works with families to understand their needs and match them up with the best providers to support their children with disabilities.

"When our son received his autism spectrum disorder diagnosis last year, our family felt like we didn't know where to turn," Schneider says. "I spent hours on the phone and weeks tracking down even the most basic information. Locating the appropriate providers was difficult and very time-consuming. And there are so many state and federal programs set up to help families, but they can be impossible to find and confusing to apply for."

It can feel like wandering around lost in the dark, with no one to show the way. Schneider's own journey fighting for her son inspired her to help others facing similar challenges.

"I want to put my experience, knowledge and passion to work helping families like ours," she says. "When we finally found the right providers and the best help for our son, it made worlds of difference. The progress he's made has been miraculous. I want to help other families find the success that we have."

Mountain Summit Consulting offers a variety of programs to suit the needs and budgets of different families.

"I know how scary and overwhelming everything feels at the beginning, but the good news is that there is so much support and help out there for you," Schneider says. "I look forward to helping parents and kids find that help."

Guardianship is a common form of decision-making that allows critical decisions to be determined by a judge and not the person for whom the decision impacts.

By putting final legal control over these critical decisions in the hands of the person with IDD, they develop a better understanding of their basic rights and how to assert themselves. It further establishes in the court and to the community at large that the person is not "incompetent" to make their own decisions, but rather emphasizes their strengths.

We are also looking for ANYONE who is open to dating someone on the spectrum.


We are also looking for COUPLES, or people who have just started seeing each other, even if you're not yet official! Either one or both of you might be autistic.

MediPal 😽



The MediPal Seatbelt ID is a simple and comprehensive medical ID that wraps around your seatbelt and slides to any comfortable position. By virtue of its location on your seatbelt, the MediPal ID can better capture the attention emergency first responders at the scene of a traffic accident and thus offer immediate access to your health condition, emergency contacts, etc.

Inside each MediPal ID is a trifold health profile form that has been filled out by the user, (or guardian). There is ample room for noting allergies, medications, recent surgeries, blood type, etc. The user can fill this information out by hand, or download a PDF version which can be filled out using a computer. The user can save their Health Profile form to their computer and can return anytime to update their information. (MediPal Inc. never has access to the user's information.) The Health Profile form is printed and inserted it into the MediPal ID holder and is ready to be placed around the seatbelt with Velcro® attachment. There is also a designated spot for placing a small photo of the user to reduce the chances of confusion when/if there are multiple passengers.

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought overwhelming grief to many families. At FEMA, our mission is to help people before, during and after disasters. We are dedicated to helping ease some of the financial stress and burden caused by the virus.

FEMA is providing financial assistance for COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred after Ja 20, 2020,



Which expenses will qualify for reimbursement?

Examples of eligible expenses for funeral services and interment or cremation may include, but not limited to:

- Transportation for up to two people to identify the deceased individual
- The transfer of remains, a casket or urn
- A burial plot or cremation niche
- A marker or headstone
- Clergy or officiant services
 The arrangement of a funeral ceremony

To be eligible for funeral assistance, you must

What information do I need to provide to FEMA?

Please have the following information before contacting FEMA to apply:

- Your name, social security number, date of birth, mailing address and contact phone numbers The name, social security number and date of birth for each deceased individual.
- The location or address where the deceased individual passed away.
- Documentation and receipts for any assistance already received from other sources, including burial or funeral insurance, donations, voluntary agencies, other government programs or non-profit organizations
- If you and another person both incurred funeral expenses for the same deceased individual(s), you can also provide that person as a co-applicant include their name, social security number and date of birth on the application.



Oxygen Cannister Filters-By Claudia C. (PASCO CNA)

e have had an oxygen concentrator in our home for our daughter for many years. Initially the vendor explained that we should clean the outside cabinet HEPA Filter, and they would be responsible for servicing the inside of the machine.

Recently our daughter was coughing, and nothing we tried would stop it. We tried cough medicine, allergy medicine, along with increasing the changing of oxygen tubing, and cleaning the outside filter on the concentrator. During this time of endless coughing and suctioning we decided to take a look into the back of the oxygen concentrator.

This concentrator was never serviced by the company after it was dropped off about 16 months ago. (We are on our 2nd Concentrator.) It was extremely dusty in the compartment, and the filter which is actually very accessible was never replaced and was completely blackened. After we discovered this problem, we immediately switched her over to an O2 E Tank and made a few phone calls to rectify this issue that was proving to be life threatening; as O2 saturation was going down, and heart rate was speeding up due to the increased secretions blocking her airway in response to the dirty dust filter. The change over to the straight oxygen gave her relief which helped us see that the concentrator dust was more than her system could handle. She was already dealing with the seasonal

I want others to know that the concentrators interior filters need to be serviced and monitored for dust. Our Invacare Perfecto2 has three filters:

- 1. A black HEPA Filter that is a fibrous, black, foam-like maze that should be washed twice a week. You do not have to use soap just rinse and dry and put it back in.
- 2. Under the HEPA Filter plastic pad on our model is a Compressor Filter that can be changed quite easily. If your compressor is on 24-7 then you will likely need to replace it 2-4 times a year. Even though our vendor suddenly stopped changing it they said they would send out a new one for us to install. If it looks dusty it is
- 3. The Bacteria Filter requires undoing some screws, but it is replaceable as well. The Invacare Manufacturer states that it should be changed every 3 years or with each time it is sent out to a new patient's home. There are several online videos to guide you through the process.

All three filters are available online at Amazon as a kit if your vendor does not come out to do regular service. The Compressor Filter is only about eight dollars, which is a small price to pay for clean air and a compressor that works well.

I hope that all caregivers could inspect the Compressor Filter minimally twice a year for dust and request a new one from the oxygen company. Caregivers could be reminded to check the Oxygen Concentrator when they change the clocks twice a year. In keeping our clients safe we need to keep a check on the cleanliness of the Oxygen Concentrator in their home. It is their lifeline.
